PASTOR'S CORNER

NOVEMBER 2023

November is a month that is closely associated with a particular bird, the Turkey. This bird has become so popular that it is seen as a symbol synonymous with the celebration of Thanksgiving in America.

But have you ever wondered how this bird attained its name? Turkeys were native only to the New World, so when the Europeans came and found them to be good eating, they quickly began shipping them back to Europe. North American Turkeys had a slight resemblance to the Guinea Fowl that were common in the Ottoman Empire.

The seat of that empire was the nation of Turkey. So, the name of "Turkey's Fowl" was applied to our native thanksgiving bird. Soon it was just shortened to "Turkey." When the newborn American Republic was looking for a national symbol, Benjamin Franklin suggested the turkey, seeing as it was a native bird and was so popular that it found its way to the tables of multitudes of families, not only in the United States, but by now the entire world. Eventually the Bald Eagle won out as our national symbol and the Turkey remained a favorite holiday meal.

In Psalm 91 we read that God is symbolically likened to a protective bird, "He who dwells in the shelter of the Highest will abide in the shadow of the Almighty...He will cover you with his feathers, and under his wings you will find refuge; his faithfulness is a shield and protector. You will not fear the terror of the night, nor the arrow that flies by day, ..." Thank God that we are more precious to Him than any bird or other creature! "So don't be afraid; you are worth more than many sparrows. " (Matthew 10:31)

Perfect Autumn Leaves and Christians

My mother's best friend, Molly, moved to Florida to become a teacher several decades ago, and when I was growing up, one of my family's October traditions was to gather colorful leaves to send to her. Molly would display the leaves on her classroom bulletin board, sharing fall foliage with kids from the Sunshine State who didn't experience the changing of the seasons.

These leaves were carefully selected. My mother's rule of thumb was that they couldn't have any insect damage or brown spots. Of course, it was a challenge to find specimens that met this rigorous standard, and I'm still in awe that we managed to track down any.

But as difficult as it is to find the perfect autumn leaf, the perfect Christian is even more elusive. As Paul notes in Romans 3:10: "None is righteous, no, not one." No mere mortal—not even a Christian—will ever meet the exacting standard of Biblical law. We all fall far short of being good, let alone perfect.

That makes Christ's statement in Matthew 5:48 even more daunting: "You, therefore, must be perfect, as your heavenly Father is perfect." That's a really high bar—and it can feel like we're doomed to failure.

However, the key here is that we are not made perfect through our own work or merit. Instead, we are made perfect through Christ and his sacrifice. As Timothy Keller writes in The Reason for God, "God's grace does not come to people who morally outperform others, but to those who admit their failure to perform and who acknowledge their need for a savior."

While, as humans, we inevitably bear the spots and stains caused by our sinful natures, those imperfections are wiped away by Christ. It takes humility to recognize this and accept the chance at perfection that He offers to us. And even after we've accepted that grace, the good we do is not through our own strength, but that of the Holy Spirit.

In short, we do not become beautiful Christians on own, but through the Trinity. As Keller puts it: "[...] every act of goodness, wisdom, justice, and beauty is empowered by God."

- The Finance Committee is working on the 2024 Budget (Randy Foringer-Chair, Jeff Smith, Bill Nicholls, Justin Walsh).
- Motion made by Bill J Smith, seconded, and passed to give \$3000.00 to 2024 First Fruits.
- Motion made by Bill Nicholls, seconded, and passed for Rev. Glunt to contact Jen Callahan that Rehoboth Church is not open to weddings for non-members.

Moderator's Items

- In Rev. Glunt's continuing education classes, he is excited to try these new ideas.
- Rev. Glunt will work to raise awareness of Rehoboth in the community by starting a podcast. A podcast is a recording/program he prepares about Rehoboth's members and events that people can listen to online whenever they wish). His podcast will be called, "Room for You."
- Rev. Glunt in raising awareness will focus on young children and families with the Nursery School.
- Rev. Glunt will work to re-invigorate the church service.
- Last, Rev. Glunt will look at Church Answers that provide demographic studies.
- Sunday, December 24, 2023, morning service, Donna Santoro (Becky Moore's sister) will play the organ/piano for the service.
- Rev. Glunt will check Mr. Walker's status for playing Christmas Eve.
- Candles will be used for the Christmas Eve service, not glowsticks.
- Motion made by Dean Rippel, seconded, and passed to approve Hayley King's Request for a Birthday Party using the social hall and basement kitchen on November 11, 2023, from 1:00-5:00 PM with 50 people attending.


