FEBRUARY BEACON ARTICLE

February is usually a cold month for those of us in the Northeastern part of the United States. So, it seems appropriate that this month should be the one where we take time express the warm feeling of love. It is in February that we celebrate Valentines Day, a day for expressing love in a manifest of displays.

When I was a schoolboy, I dreaded Valentines Day. I was made to give what I viewed as sappy cards to those I viewed as silly girls. Looking back on the experience, the cards I was required to give were undeniably cute. One had my face next to the face of the recipient. We were both in a pea pod. We were supposed to be "two peas in a pod." I'll never forget how I cringed when I handed it out.

As the years have passed, I have come to miss the innocence and simplicity of those days – though I can still feel the awkwardness of the situation. Expressing emotions can be difficult. Understanding them, sometimes next to impossible. But the Apostle Paul gives us a wonderful start on understanding the beauty and depth of love when he told those at the troubled church in Corinth, "If I speak in the tongues of men or of angels, but do not have love, I am only a resounding gong or a clanging cymbal. If I have the gift of prophecy and can fathom all mysteries and all knowledge, and if I have a faith that can move mountains, but do not have love, I am nothing. If I give all I possess to the poor and give over my body to hardship that I may boast, but do not have love, I gain nothing.

Love is patient, love is kind. It does not envy, it does not boast, it is not proud. It does not dishonor others, it is not self-seeking, it is not easily angered, it keeps no record of wrongs. Love does not delight in evil but rejoices with the truth. It always protects, always trusts, always hopes, always perseveres. Love never fails." May you find this love of which the Apostle speaks in its highest perfection - a relationship with Jesus Christ, in whom I pray you would also find your blessing today.

Avoiding a Cracked Corn Kind of Love

My Uncle Tom regularly puts out cracked corn for the deer and turkeys. One Christmas, we watched a pod of deer come running across the snowy valley—making a beeline for the backyard—when they heard Uncle Tom going outside to refill the feeder.

Pretty much everyone who meets my Uncle Tom adores him, but those deer didn't care one bit about the person who was giving them their Christmas feast. They just cared about the food. And sometimes people can start looking at God in the same way—as the source of a handout.

We see an example of this in John 6, when Jesus feeds the 5,000. Seeing the miracle, the crowd plans to "take him by force and make him king" (John 6:15). They see Jesus as the answer to physical and political problems and focus solely on what they can get out of the deal.

A more common approach to God, though, is transactional: that is, seeing God as a source of good things and doing good works to try to earn those blessings. The so-called prosperity gospel is a high-profile and somewhat extreme example of this. However, I sometimes find my own thoughts wandering a bit in this direction and must check my motivations. While we're on the right path when we do good and obey God, there is something amiss when we're motivated primarily by what we get out of it instead by our relationship with our heavenly Father.

God's ultimate goal isn't to be a source of handouts or a provider of goods and services. Instead, he's seeking a relationship with us that can be understood through the lens of an ideal and healthy parent-child relationship.

Loving parents correct and provide for their children. So does God, the ultimate loving Father. As Jesus says in Matthew 7:11, "If you then, who are evil, know how to give good gifts to your children, how much more will your Father who is in heaven give good things to those who ask him!"

Of course, even the most loving children start out as self-centered creatures. However, as they mature, they begin to care about the needs of others, often starting with their parents. (And there is a definite problem if they always see parents as nothing more than wheels and a wallet.)

Similarly, we as Christians should grow in our relationship with God, striving always to shed the selfish motivations of obtaining safety, security, and success, and instead drawing close to God and obeying him because we love him.
